Format Guidelines for Reference List:

- Double-space the References page.
- One space follows a period.
- Use a hanging indent format (first line is flush left, all other lines are indented .5 inch. In MS Word, USE Format-->Paragraph-->Hanging Indent).
- Arrange the list of references alphabetically by authors' last names (or by title if no author).
- Authors' names are inverted, followed by the initials of their first and middle names (Last name, A.A.).
- If no author is listed, list the source by title.
- The date of publication follows the author's name in parentheses.
- Capitalize only the first word of the title and subtitle of a book or article.
- Capitalize the titles of journals, magazines, and newspapers normally.
- *Italicize* titles of books, journals, magazines, etc., and the volume numbers of journals as well.

The *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (6th edition) provides extensive examples covering a wide variety of sources. Some of the most commonly cited kinds of sources are included on this page. If your particular source is not listed, check the *Publication Manual* [Ref BF 76.7 .P83 2010] or consult the [APA style website](#).

Basic Formats for Sources in Print and From Subscription Databases

(Note: When using a print version, omit the "retrieved from" information.)

A journal article

Author, A. A., Author, B. B., & Author, C. C. (Year). Title of article. *Title of Periodical*, volume number (issue number, if paginated by issue), pages. Retrieved from statement.

NOTE: List only the volume number if the periodical uses continuous pagination throughout a volume. Unlike book or article titles, periodical titles are capitalized.

Examples:

Journal article, one author

Nichols, S. (2008). An exploration of students' belongingness beliefs in

one middle school. *Journal of Experimental Education* 96, 145-169.
Retrieved from EBSCOhost Psychology and Behavioral Sciences
Collection Database.

NOTE: APA states that including database information in citations is not essential. However, the library recommends including information about databases so readers can easily locate the article.

Journal article, two authors, paginated by issue

Conner, M. & White, J. (2007). Fatherhood in contemporary black America: An invisible presence. *Black Scholar* 37 (2), 2-8.
Retrieved from EBSCOhost Psychology and Behavioral Sciences Collection database.

NOTE: If each issue begins with page 1, then list the issue number.

Journal article, three to six authors

Method for moderation: Measuring lifetime risk of alcohol-attributable mortality as a basis for drinking guidelines. *International Journal of Methods in Psychiatric Research*, 17, 141-151. Retrieved from EBSCOhost Psychology and Behavioral Sciences Collection database.

Journal article, more than six authors

Naar-King, S., Wright, K., Parsons, J., Frey, M., Templin, T., Lam, P., et al. (2006). Healthy choices: Motivational enhancement therapy for health risk behavior in HIV-positive youth. *AIDS Education & Prevention*, 18, 1-11. Retrieved from EBSCOhost Psychology and Behavioral Sciences Collection database.

Journal article with DOI (Digital Object Identifier)

Anderson, J.E. & Mueller, T.E. (2008). Trends in sexual risk behavior and unprotected sex among high school students, 1991-2005: The role of substance abuse. *Journal of School Health*, 78, 575-580. doi:10.1111/j.1746-1561.2008.00348.x.

NOTE: When DOI is given in the citation, make no reference to the database used.

Sample in-text citation for paraphrased evidence from the journal article above:

Anderson and Mueller (2008) assert that regardless of the type of illegal drug used, high school-aged drug users engaged in unprotected sex more often than those students who did not use illegal drugs.

A magazine or newspaper article

Magazine article, one author

Bowers, C. (2005, July). Address thoughts and actions of teens with addicted parents. *Addiction Professional*, 3 (4), pp. 42-43.
Retrieved from Gale Academic ASAP database.

Newspaper article, one author

Carey, B. (2006, March 21). Revisiting schizophrenia: Are drugs always needed? *New York Times*, p. F1. Retrieved from EBSCOhost Newspaper Source Plus database.

Magazine or newspaper article, no author named

Setback for equality: Voters in three states approve bans on same-sex marriage. (2008, November 9). *The Washington Post*, p. B6.
Retrieved from EBSCOhost Newspaper Source Plus database.

NOTE: The date includes the month and day of the issue, but the order is inverted (Year, Month Day). Also, the citation for this source would include a shortened form of the title and date: (Setback, 2008). Page numbers are preceded by either p. for a single page or pp. for multiple pages for magazine and newspaper articles.



A book or part of a book

A book with a single author

Author, A. A. (Year of publication). *Title of work: Capital letter also for subtitle.* City of publication, State: Publisher.

NOTE: For city of publication, always use the first city listed; also include the state, abbreviated.

Nydegger, R.V. (2008). *Understanding and treating depression: Ways to find hope and help.* Westport, CT: Praeger.

Part of a book or an essay from an edited collection or reference book

Author, A. A., & Author, B. B. (Year of publication). Title of chapter.
In A. Editor & B. Editor (Eds.), *Title of book* (pp. of chapter).
City, State: Publisher.

NOTE: Only specify page numbers when you are referring to parts of books: (pp. 1-21).

Essay in an edited collection

O'Neil, J. M., & Egan, J. (1992). Men's and women's gender role journeys: Metaphor for healing, transition, and transformation.
In B. R. Wainrib (Ed.), *Gender issues across the life cycle* (pp. 107-123). New York, NY: Springer.

Article from a reference book

Weinstein, R. M. (2001). Deinstitutionalization movement. In C. D. Bryant (Ed.) *Encyclopedia of criminology and deviant behavior* (Vol. 4, pp. 171-174). Philadelphia, PA: Brunner-Routledge.

An essay or article from a book published in a subscription database

Carl Gustav Jung. (1998). In *Encyclopedia of world biography* (2nd ed.)
Detroit, MI: Gale. Retrieved from Gale Biography Resource Center database.

An eBook from Bakersfield College Library's collection

Author, A. A. (Date of publication). *Title of Book.* Retrieved from NetLibrary database.

Edmiston, B. (2008). *Forming identities in early childhood play.*
Retrieved from NetLibrary database.

NOTE: APA states that including database information in citations is not essential. However, the library recommends including information about databases so readers can easily locate the book.

Basic Forms for Internet Documents and Audiovisual Media

A Web Page or Internet Document (see APA publications for more information)

Author, A. A., & Author, B. B. (Date of publication). *Title of document.*
Retrieved from <http://web address>

NOTE: Provide a URL that links directly to the section, not the home page of the website.

Web pages with complete information

Phelps, J. (2007, November). *Weight gain and bipolar disorder treatment.* Retrieved from
<http://www.psycheducation.org/hormones/Insulin/weightgain.htm>

Web pages with no author or date listed

Title of document. (n.d.). Retrieved month, day, year, from
<http://web address>

NOTE: When the author is not listed, begin the entry with the title. When the publication or update date is unavailable, use (n.d.) for no date and use the date of retrieval in the citation.

Television broadcast

Egan, D. (Writer), & Alexander, J. (Director). (2005) Failure to communicate [Television series episode]. In D. Shore (Executive producer), **House**. New York, NY: Fox Broadcasting.
